FLEET ISSUES:

- Coordinating and transportation of vehicle equipment and supplies to and from Fleet Auto Service (West Haven, CT) for current upfitting process. As vehicles are being completed, in addition to transporting vehicles I am currently setting vehicles up so they are ready for patrol (programming new ICOP DVR units, transporting to and from graphic shop, etc).
- Performing and/or coordinating the transporting all repairs to vehicles in police fleet needing emergency lighting-siren/ aftermarket vehicle equipment/ ICOP units/ and mobile data terminal repair.
- Still working with IT, attempting to resolve several minor issues with in car computer systems in many of the new patrol vehicles as well as minor issues with existing fleet, particularly 12 DA and 222 DA.
- ICOP – Performing all physical maintenance and repairs to DVR units and additional components as capabilities allow. Remediating issues with defective components with Safety Vision as well follow up on all recent purchase orders and writing new purchase orders for additional equipment that is necessary to keep the system functioning. Routine contact with sales, customer service and tech support for warranty and repair/replacement of equipment. Repaired ICOP units as well as replaced batteries from individual officers' portable wireless microphones.
- Coordinating repairs with Fleet Auto supply for warranty repairs as well as repairs beyond internal capabilities.
- Vehicle maintenance/repair requests being coordinated on a daily basis by way of fax and email contact with PW.
- Fleet registration renewals (DMV)
- Fleet emissions compliance testing (transporting to and from testing facility for individual testing).
- ELSAG License Plate Readers- Addressing daily technical issues, meeting with reps in attempts to get system in full operation, waiting for new mount for new camera system for optimum performance.

Subject: **Police Explorer Monthly Activity Report – September 2012**

September was a very busy month for the Explorers. As we came into the 11th anniversary of the 9/11/01 terrorist attacks against our nation, our training and education focus for the month was aimed at disaster preparation our future law enforcement in areas of the civil preparedness and homeland security.

The month started on the 8th, with a squad of Explorers returning to the **Danbury Youth Soccer** parking detail every Saturday from 0700 to 1300 hours at the Old Ridgebury Road fields. Explorers are now opening and closing the fields, directing vehicles and assisting in parking them to maximize parking lot capacity, and assisting with keeping track of the small children (soccer players) to ensure their safety when moving through the parking lot, where visibility is limited. We have been sending an average of 10-12 Explorers each Saturday, with an Advisor, who volunteers their time for that day. We rotate the youth and the advisors weekly. Explorers have been there every Saturday since.

Also on the 8th, Explorers and Advisors were split into different squads/details to cover the many assignments associated with the **Taste of Greater Danbury** weekend events. These assignments commenced at 0700 on Saturday and continued until approximately 2100 hours on Sunday (9/11). On Saturday, Explorers were at the Taste of Danbury securing the streets around the Danbury Green, assisting vendors to their vending locations and assisting the assigned Special Events officers with crowd control/security duties. These assignments lasted until approximately 1300 hours on this date when the event was called off due to severe weather (tornado) concerns. We did return on the 9th as scheduled and had over 50 Explorers work through various shifts and assignments during the weekend hours. Besides covering the three street entrances to the Taste of Danbury (as we have done since its inception), Explorers and their advisors also took on other activities and were asked to assist with monitor the municipal parking lots that were used for the vendors.

The Explorers returned on Sunday (9/9) morning at 0800 to man the barricades again at the Taste of Danbury. On Sunday, the weather was nice and the turnout at the Taste of Danbury was exceptional. Explorers and their advisors secured from the Taste of Danbury at approximately 2100 hours after cleaning up and packing away all their equipment from the day's events.

On September 15th, at 1500 hours, a squad of Explorers, with an advisor, went to Danbury High School to assist with the annual **DHS Band Jamboree**. The Explorers assisted the band parents with traffic control and parking in the lots of the school. They secured from there once all the vehicles were parked and returned to the PD at approximately 1830 hours.

On September 16th, the Explorers returned to the Danbury Green to assist with the **Brazilian Cultural Festival Day**. The event had a large attendance and 18 Explorers assisted with the closing of roads around the Green area and traffic control to and from the local businesses, which remained open during the day. The festival was an all day event.

During the week of September 18th, the **Vietnam Memorial Dignity Wall** arrived in Danbury and was set up at Rogers Park in front of the War Memorial. The Explorers had been contacted months in advance and we were asked to provide assistance while the memorial was in operation. Explorers completed shifts at the memorial on 9/21, 9/22 and 9/23. Duties included manning the crosswalks, parking lot assistance, standing as a visible physical deterrent to vandalism, assisting the handicapped with walking through the memorial and assisting with locating the names of the deceased/honored through the use of the computer database. Our Explorers were one of several different youth groups to assist at this memorial, but they were the only ones who were so actively involved with assisting the attendees. As most of our Explorers were born after the Vietnam War, it was a very educational event for them as well.

September 29th found the explorers once again at the **Candace Williams 5k Run** which started at 0800 and ended at 1030 hours. This event was an all volunteer run in memory of Candace Williams who was a 9/11 victim from Danbury. This run had two squads of Explorers assigned to it and the turnout was good for the event.

As you can see, we ended the month with 66 Explorers registered. This is a decrease since last month's report. Some of the decrease came from several Explorers leaving for college and/or enlistments to military service. Several Explorers were asked to leave as they were not meeting our minimum standards of attendance and conduct. This number does not reflect any of the anticipated "new interests" that may come from our annually required "First Night" event, which we have pushed off until sometime in early November.
