Dealt with and referred calls regarding all aspects of policing, numerous child passenger safety questions/ issues as well as setting appointments for child seat inspections at the DPD fitting station.
- Neighborhood Watch: Proactive patrols of neighborhood watch locations. Spoken with both active and non-active NW groups. Follow up with recent contacts regarding the formation/implementation of new groups throughout city. Heritage Dr./ Richter Dr., Coordinating talks and presentations.
- Researching and relaying crime and neighborhood statistics for prospective homebuyers within the community
- Mobile Operations Center- Routine maintenance/ repairs/ operation/ callouts

- Bank Alarms- Liaison – Updating as necessary.

**FLEET ISSUES:**

- Coordinating repairs with Fleet Auto supply for warranty repairs as well as repairs beyond internal capabilities.
- Vehicle maintenance/repair requests being coordinated on a daily basis by way of daily maintenance logs and contact with PW. Transporting vehicles to off site facilities on need be basis for repairs (glass, etc)
- ICOP –Physical maintenance and repairs as well as routine contact with sales, customer service and repair for warranty and repair/replacement of equipment.
- Fleet registration renewals (DMV)
- Fleet emissions compliance testing (transporting to and from testing facility for individual testing).
- Dealing with auto insurance companies for police vehicle involved crashes, filing claims, appraisals, etc.
- Overseeing civilian volunteer who assist with fleet

- Mobile Data Terminal Issues-Attempting to remedy past/ current problems and make ready for the new patrol vehicles.
- LSAG License Plate Readers- Addressing issues that are arising from the addition of two units to our fleet, meeting with reps in attempts to get system in full operation.

## **DANBURY PAL DIRECTOR'S REPORT – SEPTEMBER 2011**

**PAL had a busy summer season, with two programs running simultaneously, softball and the seven-week Summer Camp. Softball saw increases in attendance and participation while the Summer Camp, while successful, saw a decline in attendance for the second consecutive summer. In speaking with other providers in the greater Danbury area, they also experienced a decline in their enrollment.**

**PAL, for the first time, partnered with The City of Danbury and facilitated a summer work program for 30 high school aged boys and girls from the greater Danbury area. The program gave these youth the chance to work and experience three different types of work. Some of them worked as Landscapers, some were Tutors for younger children, and the others worked in the woodworking room at Danbury High as would be Carpenters. The program, run through the CT Department of Labor, was highly successful because success is centered on the students chosen attendance, and Danbury achieved a high degree of attendance. Because of this success, we hope we will be included in this state program again next year.**

**PAL, on the second of August, also ran its third annual “Bob DiNardo” Memorial Golf Tournament at Oxford Greens in Oxford, CT. Always a fun and well attended event, we had over 80 golfers for the day which included lunch, prizes and a dinner afterward.**

**At the conclusion of the camp, volleyball camp used the gym for the next week, with both Danbury High and Newtown High sharing the facility for their players.**

**On the second weekend in Sept. PAL was the host for the annual Kid’s Closet giant tag sale that lasted for three days. It’s an event that gives parents a chance to sell their children’s used clothing, toys, strollers, and other items that new parents might need for their new families. A great event for PAL and the parents in the area.**

**On the third weekend in September, PAL hosted a safety day which featured Police and Fire department safety demonstrations as well as the showing of a Police Helicopter at the event. Well attended and well received by all members of the community.**

**Last but not least, PAL is proud to be the sponsors of the SNYRA annual reunion to be held here on September 25<sup>th</sup>, between the hours of 11-4. It is a nostalgic look back in time of The Great Danbury State Fair and the cars that raced in the Racereena. The day will feature the Cars and Drivers of that era, it should be a great showcase of a part of Danbury’s history.**

Subject: **Police Explorer Monthly Activity Report – August 2011**

This month started on a fun, yet solemn note, with a contingent of 30 Explorers and advisors attending the annual Connecticut Law Enforcement Memorial Day at Lake Compounce Amusement Park in Bristol, on August 2<sup>nd</sup>. The cost was \$60 per person, but the Post was able to subsidize a portion of the cost for attendees through recent fundraising efforts, so it only cost \$30 per Explorer. The Post had to rent a school bus to get the group to Lake Compounce as our Post vans were out being repaired. P.O. Antedomenico and Civilian Associate Advisor Cohn were the adults in charge. The whole contingent attended the candlelight vigil and memorial service for Connecticut’s Fallen Officers. This is the fourth time that we have attended this event in the past five years.

On Saturday, August 20<sup>th</sup>, took a small select team of 7 Explorers to the Waterbury Police Explorer’s Post Explorer Competition Day. There they competed with over 150 other explorers in a stations day style competition, with training programs interspersed between the competitions. Waterbury PD sponsored this event and this is the second year that they have put this on. It was our first year in attendance. The attendees came back to the Post at our regular meeting and reported on their experiences. P.O. Cameron and P.O. Antedomenico attended with the explorers. After their assessment, it was discussed about sending our competition travel team next year to represent our city.

Although we see our Explorers often in the education/training mode or in the community service work mode, once in a while we take time out for a social event to keep the morale high among the members. On August 24<sup>th</sup>, our Post set up a night of GLOW bowling at the Lore’s Lanes bowling alley in New Milford. As well as being a “social outing,” it also was a small fundraiser for the Post. Approximately 23 Explorers, with many bringing guests, came out for the evening. Four advisors chaperoned the event (P.O.s Antedomenico, Tragni, and Civilian Associate Advisors Cohn and DaSilveira) which lasted for two hours of reduced cost bowling. A good time was had by all and a small amount of money was raised while doing so.

When Tropical Storm Irene came to our City, we had approximately 20 Explorers who braved treacherous weather conditions early in the morning, come to police headquarters on that wet and windy Sunday (August 28<sup>th</sup>) to assist our Department. Several teams of Explorers were rotated through the storm shelter at the War Memorial, working to assist residents and staff in any way needed. Also Explorers were utilized to assist the Department with its response to calls in the field, while at headquarters. In fact, a squad of Explorers ended up helping members of the Public Works Department with sand bagging the police department parking lot when the flood waters rose and assisting with removing the sand bags when the waters began to recede.

As noted in the July report, August continued to be a bad month for the aging Explorer vehicles, with both the vans having to be taken out of service due to mechanical problems. The older van, a red 1991

Ford Econoline passenger van with over 108,000 miles on it had been diagnosed with a cracked head. The vehicle was repaired at a cost of \$1500. The grey van, a 2000 Chevrolet with over 102,000, miles has been down for several weeks with what appeared to be a transmission problem. Luckily the problem was not the transmission, but was a rotted line that carried the transmission fluid. The vehicle was repaired and the cost to the post was approximately \$230. It still needs additional work. To help defray these costs of repairs, the post has undertaken a cookie dough sales fundraiser, which began on August 25<sup>th</sup>. It appears at this time to have been successful and I will report on the final results in next month's report.

During the end of July and the month of August, the Post has had to say goodbye to some of our key senior Explorer leaders and one police officer advisor as they have aged out, gone off to school and been called to active military duty. Officer Rich DeJesus has been called to a year of active duty with the U.S. Navy.

We had several ranking Explorers go off to their freshman year of college. Explorer Deputy Chief Brianna McNally has gone to Fordham in Manhattan; Explorer Lieutenant Sebastian Ramirez has entered the Massachusetts Maritime Academy; and Explorer Sergeant Brian Medina to the University of Connecticut.

They have joined the ranks of Explorer Chief Rob Didato, Explorer Deputy Chief Matt Deitz and Explorer Sergeant Steven Rountos at Western Connecticut State University; Explorer Lieutenant Anthony Hanna and Explorer Corporal Kelsey Sullivan at University of New Haven; and Explorer Corporal Steven Wong at UCONN. Former Explorer Chief Meighan McNally, currently a Deputy Chief, is now working on her post graduate degree taking classes at WCSU.

With all these Explorers attending area colleges and universities, we are seeing a spike in interest and membership from older, more mature young adults interested in law enforcement as a career. This being said, we are also getting many more inquiries about the program from younger teens that are showing strong interest in the program as well. With the local schools back in session and our annual open house on the horizon, we will quickly fill the openings left by our members who have moved on to further education.

As you can see, we ended the month with 74 Explorers registered. This is a decrease of 3 since last month's report. These represent explorers who were asked to leave the program for various violations of our program's Rules and Regulations. With a waiting list in place, we have worked to tighten our standards and "raise the bar" for our young charges.
